BLACK SANTA



The 'Black Santa' tradition at Belfast Cathedral was first established in 1976 by Dean Sammy Crooks. Now in its 43rd year, the Black Santa Annual Sit-Out reaches over 500 charities across Northern Ireland each year!



The Sit-Out attracts considerable attention in the local press, radio and television. Black Santa takes place the week before Christmas, and the Dean dresses in the familiar black, Anglican clerical doak. From the first appeal, Dean Crooks was described in the local press as "Belfast's Black Santa". The description struck a lasting chord with the public!

Inspired by Dean Sammy Crooks, the four succeeding Deans of Belfast (Deans Shearer, McKelvey, Mann, and Forde) have continued the Black Santa tradition over more than forty years, so that each year the generosity of the people of Belfast and individuals across the world continues to help hundreds of charities.

The charities involved with Black Santa range from medical research, those caring for children, youth and the elderly, the improvement of employment opportunities, as well as a host of small charities which cannot afford paid fundraisers. A proportion of the funds is also given to Christian Aid.

Each year, Black Santa receives hundreds of applications for funding. After Christmas, the chosen organisations are invited to send representatives to the Good Samaritans Service, usually held in the following February where the donated funds are distributed. It is important to note that all donations raised during the Black Santa Sit-Out, go directly to charities across Northern Ireland.





Christmas Carols! Christmas trees! Christmas Lights! Christmas Presents! Each points us to the excitement of Christmas coming. But above all Christmas is about giving. Into the darkest month of the year, the Season of Christmas calls all people to find a peace and a joy which is often missing from too many lives. The gift of giving is what transforms Christmas from "humbug" into a truly special time of the year, as even Ebenezer Scrooge discovered in Charles Dickens' Christmas Tale.

As Dean of Belfast it is the giving of so many people to Black Santa which, for me, makes the days before Christmas very special. Some will give bundles of notes, wrapped up in a rubber band. Others will dig deep into their pocket for their last penny or pound coin. Often there is a story to tell, or the surprise at discovering a barrel to fill, and the chance to give in a Belfast street. And this year you will even be able to give to Black Santa with your contactless card! A simple tap of the plastic, and a person that you do not know, whose needs are different from yours, will find that your giving makes a world of difference to their situation.

Black Santa means so much to me, because so many people find a deeper meaning to their Christmas by giving a little of themselves to support over 500 local charities. And when Christmas Eve arrives, and Belfast Cathedral is filled with people singing carols and hearing again the story of a baby born long ago, who is still God's greatest gift to all, then the giving which each one has made to this year's Black Santa Appeal becomes part of a much greater giving. When we give of ourselves, we discover we are given back so much more. It is this which can be the mirade of Christmas.

May the joy and peace of this Christmas find a place in your heart and life as the Black Santa gift you give brings joy, hope or satisfaction to all those who will be blessed by your giving.
