If I speak in the tongues of mortals and of angels, but do not have love, I am a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal. And if I have prophetic powers, and understand all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have all faith, so as to remove mountains, but do not have love, I am nothing. If I give away all my possessions, and if I hand over my body so that I may boast, but do not have love, I gain nothing.

Love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or boastful or arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things.

Belfast Samaritans have been providing confidential emotional support for 60 years (1961 – 2021)

It is appropriate that the 60th Anniversary Service is being held in St Anne's Cathedral, for it was after a meeting in the Cathedral's Chapter House, chaired by Dean Peacocke, that Belfast Branch of Samaritans was established; taking its first calls on 1st November 1961.

Belfast Samaritans was the first branch to be established in Ireland and now extends to 21 Branches, 8 in Northern Ireland and 13 in the Republic of Ireland. Belfast was also the thirteenth branch to be established within the wider organisation, which today extends to 201 branches with over 20,000 volunteers across the UK and Ireland, supporting approximately 10,000 calls for help every single day of the year.

Back in 1961, the late Dr WGM Thomson, a Presbyterian Minister, was the first Director of Belfast Samaritans. He was a man of great compassion and vision and wanted to ensure this new branch would be established on a sound foundation and be well supported across all communities in Northern Ireland. To this end, he appointed 3 deputies from the other 3 main churches; the late Reverend Jim Musgrave, the late Father Hugh Murphy and the late Reverend Sydney Callaghan. Dr Thomson, or Bill as he was known, was honoured in 1966 when he succeeded the Founder of Samaritans, the Reverend Chad Varah, as National Chairman, a role he performed for two years with distinction.

Samaritans is all about having time for others who are finding life difficult. Those who volunteer are people from across the entire religious and non-religious spectrum, from all sections of the community whom Samaritans aspire to serve and support.

During our 60 years, Volunteers have continued to offer confidential emotional support to anyone who is struggling to cope, providing a safe place for callers to talk openly about whatever is worrying them and without fear of being judged. We listen, encourage exploration of options, and hope callers can find ways of coping with their distress without choosing to take their own life.

The last 18 months has been an extremely challenging time for everyone in Northern Ireland, including Belfast Samaritans. The pandemic forced a significant number of listening volunteers to step back from duties, to close our doors to face-to-face callers, and cease most of our outreach activities. This has put pressure on our branch and similarly the whole organisation. However, throughout all of this, volunteers have gone beyond expectation to ensure we continue to provide our helpline service, every day of the year, just as we have done this past 60 years.

During the 12 months to 31st March 2021, Belfast Branch supported our callers both locally and further afield, by responding to over 32,000 telephone calls, replying to just over 2,600 e-mails and having approximately 290 contacts with callers via our new on-line chat service.
