WELCOME

Welcome to this Advent Carol Service at Belfast Cathedral, which marks the beginning of the church's year.

Face coverings **must be worn** when entering and exiting the building, and when singing the hymns. We request members of the congregation to wear face coverings throughout the service. Under government guidance for the purposes of keeping Contact Tracing Records it is essential that you complete the information in the insert provided. Note about the service

Due to ongoing restrictions there will be no procession of choir and clergy during the service. However, candles will be lit during the service from the West End to the East, to symbolize the coming of Christ, the Light of the World. This will be done during the singing of each of the Magnificat Antiphons (see note, below).

MAGNIFICAT ANTIPHONS

The front cover features a mediaeval illumination from a manuscript of the plainsong 'O' antiphons.

The antiphons, which are sung by the cathedral choir throughout tonight's service, refer to the seven antiphons that are recited before the Magnificat during Evening Prayer in the Octave before Christmas, 17th to 23rd December. The exact origin of the 'O Antiphons' is not known but they have been part of the liturgical tradition since the very early Church.

The importance of the 'O Antiphons' is twofold, each one highlights a title for the Messiah: O Sapientia (O Wisdom), O Adonai (O Lord), O Radix Jesse (O Root of Jesse), O Clavis David (O Key of David), O Oriens (O Rising Sun), O Rex Gentium (O King of the Nations), and O Emmanuel. Also, each one refers to the prophecy of Isaiah of the coming of the Messiah.

Please note that, during the service, there must be no recording of any kind, nor is photography permitted. Thank you.

A note on the Cinq Méditations sur l'Apocalypse by Jean Langlais (1907-91)

Jean Langlais, one of the finest and most prolific French composers for organ, conceived these meditations over the course of thirty years, with the first performance given by the composer in Notre-Dame de Paris in 1974. The collection was one of only a few of his works that was not commissioned; this gave him considerably more creative freedom. The impetus for completing the work was his acute ill health in 1973. During the long period of recovery, he became obsessed with the Revelation of St John the Divine. Instead of portraying or summarising the narrative, Langlais decided to express through music specific visions that he himself received during his many re-readings of the text. These pieces are appropriate for the Advent Carol Services, four of which will be played tonight: movements 1, 2, and 4 before the service, and movement 5 at the end.

Movement I: "Celui qui a des oreilles, qu'il écoute": Revelation 2, 7, "He that hath ears, let him hear what the Spirit saith unto the churches". St John has been instructed to address the seven churches, which Langlais signifies by stating the plainsong Te Deum (on Tone IV) in the pedals seven times.

Movement 2: "Il était, Il est et Il vient": Revelation I, 4, "He is, He was, and He is to come". Langlais portrays the concept of the eternity of Christ three times in this movement, with a held 'F' in the soprano. The movement is split into five sections, signifying Eternity, Christ crucified (through the plainsong, Vexilla Regis), Eternity, Christ glorified (through the plainsong, Lauda Sion), and Eternity.

Movement 4: "Oh oui, viens, Seigneur Jésus" from the final verse of Revelation, "He which testifieth these things saith, surely I come quickly. Amen. Even so, come, Lord Jesus". This movement is an introspective meditation in typical Langlais fashion.

Movement 5: La Cinquième Trompette: The Fifth Trumpet. This is a portrayal of Revelation 9, I-II: "And the fifth angel sounded, and I saw a star fall from heaven unto the earth: and to him was given the key of the bottomless pit. And he opened the bottomless pit; and there arose a smoke out of the pit, as the smoke of a great furnace; and the sun and the air were darkened by reason of the smoke of the pit."

The Dean says the **ADVENT BIDDING PRAYER:**

In the name of God, who has delivered us from the dominion of darkness and made a place for us in the kingdom of his beloved Son, we welcome you: grace to you and peace.

As we meet to celebrate anew the coming of God's kingdom, we hear revealed the mystery of God's loving purpose for us – how that when we were far off, he met us in his Son and brought us home; how he humbled himself to take our human nature, that we might share his divine glory.

Let us then celebrate this coming with our Advent carols and hymns of praise, that our lives may be charged with his life; that we may bear witness to his glory and so bring light to those who sit in darkness. So first we pray for those among whom the Christ was born: the poor and helpless, the aged and young children; the cold, the hungry and the homeless; the victims of poverty, injustice, and oppression, the sick and those who mourn, the lonely and the unloved; those in despair or in the shadow of death.

Then, as we hear again the message of peace on earth and goodwill among all his people, we pray for the leaders of this and all nations, that they may be inspired to work together for the establishment of justice, freedom, and peace the world over.

And that we may bear true witness to this hope in a divided world, we pray for the peace and unity of Christ's Body, the Church universal, that the whole earth may live to praise his name.

Finally, as we rejoice with the saints in heaven and on earth, we remember all who have gone before us with the sign of faith, whose hope was in the Word made flesh, Jesus Christ our Lord, through whom we offer up our prayers for the coming of his kingdom, in the words he himself has taught us, saying:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come; thy will be done; on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation; but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, the power and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

And when he comes may the Lord find us watching and waiting, now and at all times. **Amen.**

CHOIR ANTIPHON: O Sapientia

O Wisdom, which camest out of the mouth of the most High, and reachest from one end to another, mightily, and sweetly ordering all things: Come and teach us the way of prudence.

READING: Isaiah 25, vv 6-9

On this mountain the LORD of hosts will make for all peoples a feast of rich food, a feast of well-matured wines, of rich food filled with marrow, of well-matured wines strained clear. And he will destroy on this mountain the shroud that is cast over all peoples, the sheet that is spread over all nations; he will swallow up death for ever. Then the Lord GOD will wipe away the tears from all faces, and the disgrace of his people he will take away from all the earth, for the LORD has spoken. It will be said on that day, Lo, this is our God; we have waited for him, so that he might save us. This is the LORD for whom we have waited; let us be glad and rejoice in his salvation.

READING: Genesis 3, vv 1-15

Now the serpent was more crafty than any other wild animal that the LORD God had made. He said to the woman, 'Did God say, "You shall not eat from any tree in the garden"?' The woman said to the serpent, 'We may eat of the fruit of the trees in the garden; but God said, "You shall not eat of the fruit of the tree that is in the middle of the garden, nor shall you touch it, or you shall die." 'But the serpent said to the woman, 'You will not die; for God knows that when you eat of it your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God, knowing good and evil.' So when the woman saw that the tree was good for food, and that it was a delight to the eyes, and that the tree was to be desired to make one wise, she took of its fruit and ate;

and she also gave some to her husband, who was with her, and he ate. Then the eyes of both were opened, and they knew that they were naked; and they sewed fig leaves together and made loincloths for themselves.

They heard the sound of the LORD God walking in the garden at the time of the evening breeze, and the man and his wife hid themselves from the presence of the LORD God among the trees of the garden. Many peoples shall come and say, 'Come, let us go up to the mountain of the LORD, to the house of the God of Jacob; that he may teach us his ways and that we may walk in his paths.' For out of Zion shall go forth instruction, and the word of the LORD from Jerusalem. He shall judge between the nations, and shall arbitrate for many peoples; they shall beat their swords into ploughshares, and their spears into pruning-hooks; nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war anymore. O house of Jacob, come, let us walk in the light of the LORD!

The glory of Lebanon shall be given to it, the majesty of Carmel and Sharon. They shall see the glory of the LORD, the majesty of our God.



What art thou? that we may give an answer unto them that sent us.


